Packard Museum Visit A Reunion with a Favorite Childhood Car


I and other members of our club and some from the Mercedes Club Pittsburgh chapter were thrilled to be on the Packard Museum Fall Leaf Tour enjoying the sun-specked road route of course but culminating in a wonderful tour of the Warren Ohio National Packard Museum "treasure trove" display of unique Packard history and its fine cars! There is a Jargon article with pictures by event leader and organizer Shadrach Jones in this issue.

Thank-you for a job well done, Shadrach!

Take it from me – the tour and museum visit were spectacular and enjoyed by all. Particularly, I was excited to see the 1956 Patrician finished in Mohave Tan (copper) and Dover White in the museum shown here. Hint: We go back a long way!



As a six-year-old car crazy kid, my grandfather Sam took me along to take delivery of that very model finished in a dignified charcoal "Maltese Gray Iridescent" with light silver-gray tapestry and leather interior – I was always in love with that car and from the very beginning. The dealer was the tiny Chas. G. Becker Motors near Magee Hospital on the Blvd. of the Allies which was also a Mercedes franchise (who also sold us the 68 280 SEL (928 built) 12 years later from showroom inventory that's still in my garage today)! Check out the picture below of an actual dealership Mercedes key case which is quite rare too.

I still can't believe that tiny, cramped showroom that held about three cars making a likely tough choice for management for display vehicles between legendary MB and Packard marques!

The amazing '56 Packard Patrician was their top of the line sedan that featured innovative, expensive tech and standard equipment such as twin torsion bar suspension boosted by hydraulic rear load leveling, unique electric relay push button transmission selection, innovative side marker lights flushmounted beautifully in the rear door trim, variable electric wipers including long and short sweep arcs and full power such as seats, antennae and windows throughout. I can still remember my grandfather telling me that he knew Packard was "in trouble" at the time but that he felt as an engineer and executive that the car felt better, drove better and delivered higher quality/innovation than its competition (Lincoln and Cadillac). A side story was that he taught me the difference between "left" and "right" directions up in Erie as I sat in the passenger seat of that silent car in front of all that gorgeous, anodized gold textured grilling of the dash enhanced by the lovely Packard crest. For many years, I saw that dash every time I thought of either left or right road turns so the lesson stuck immediately.

The car was resourcefully and handsomely styled by legendary (young) Dick Teague who did a masterful job updating the old 1951 body shell given Packard's financial challenges which would make the '55 -'56 cars the last "real" Packards before Studebaker Hawk platform sharing for '57 and '58. The beautiful body character of the '55'-'56 cars however, including the stainless steel "Saran Wrap" full length body cladding and the famous "Cathedral taillights just above each side's bumper-exit dual exhaust ports were masterpieces. The cars were elegant and classy. Remember, Teague was designer of the AMC AMX, Javelin, Tarpon and even the unusual Pacer



among other distinctive cars. The picture above of a die cast model in 1/43 scale (remarkably done in Maltese Gray) has been in my collection for years. Extremely impressive ride and high performance to boot provided by Packard's "death bed"- developed 374 cu OHV V8. There were only 3,774 Patricians built in 1956. Talk about ending on a high note!!

And yes, Sam did keep the car in beautiful condition while singing its praises for the rest of his life, passing away in the sixties. I asked my grandmother for the car but unfortunately with a smile, it went to one of her cousins in Tampa instead...


I appreciate several of you who have served as past JCOP presidents for your counsel, availability and

JCOP Concours Celebrates 50th anniversary of Jaguar XJS

This year's JCOP Concours d'Elegance was held at the Fox Chapel Yacht Club on Sept. 20, 2025. This year marks the 50th anniversary of Jaguar's XJS. A convertible model is etched onto the custom-made trophies that were presented to all class winners.

Many members are eligible for the North Central Region award, competing in at least 2 concours in the region, or the JCNA North American award, competing in at least 3 concours in any region. **JCOP's Shadrach Jones** showed in the Jaguar Club of Ohio, (JCO), and as such he is in the running for a regional award with his 1991 XJ6 VDP, Saloon, in Regency Red. **Tony Bardelli** showed in the same two shows and the Susquehanna Valley Jaguar Club making him eligible for a North American award. He showed his 2018 XF Sport Brake S in Silicon Silver. **Terry Smith** (JCOP) showed his 1967 E-Type, Open Two Seater, OTS, in Dark Blue. Terry will probably win a North American trophy.

JCOP's Cecile and Carl Canales received a "Best of Class" award for their very well prepared 2007 XK, White convertible in the Champion Division. Ken Como (JCOP) showed his 2024 F-Type 75 and his wife Linda, not to be outdone, received a first-place trophy for her 1992 XJS Black convertible. The only tie in the show was when JCOP member Tom Nuhfer's 2007 XKR British Racing Green convertible scored the same as Dave Morgan, Jaguar Association of Central Ohio with his 2009 XKR Portfolio convertible in Shadow Grey.

Ron Gaertner from the Virginia Jaguar Club entered 2 early Jaguars, a 1953 XK-120, Fixed Head Coupe, in Green and an XK-150 Drop Head Coupe in Red. He received perfect scores for both Jaguars. **Robert Seyler**, a member of JCOP and JCO, showed his 100-point XK-140 in Black.

Besides competing with his Jaguar, Rich found time to judge and announce all of the class winners.

Mike Meyer, chief judge of the Jaguar Club of Ohio, competed with his 2019 F-Pace S, SUV in Black. I judged

Dominic, JCO's Concours Chairman, and Irene Perri's well prepared 2006 XJ8 VDP, Saloon in Slate Grey.

After a trip through northwest Allegheny County and



Beaver County we arrived at a perennial favorite, Anderson's Candies in Baden, PA. Coolers were quickly filled with chocolates and other treats and the tour continued along the industrial Ohio River Valley before venturing off into forested areas of Beaver County. This "Tara" is, of course, the Country Inn that is located up north from Pittsburgh in beautiful Mercer County. While we all had to individually travel to the "meet up point", the group then enjoyed a drive to Tara of about one and a half hours.

We thought we had planned things very well since this Sunday was a Steelers "Bye Week" with no game and we got sunshine for our drive. However, due to a multitude of factors including a four-to-five week drought in August/September and the weather being warm with no frost as of yet, the foliage was far from being in prime splendor. We still saw some color and those of us with sun roofs certainly opened the inside covers wide so anyone, including some in rear seats, could see the trees not only out the windows but also by looking upwards. It has turned out that whatever leaves stayed on the trees and did not turn brown and fall during the drought are only turning color around the time of this edition of Jaguar Jargon being published. No one went away hungry or disappointed; the quality of the servings was first class. If anything, the food even exceeded our high previous experiences there. The prime rib (with horseradish sauce to accompany it if desired) was as tasty as any your author had ever eaten. Others raved over the turkey and stuffing and all "fixins", others enjoyed the lox and bagels, or the ham, or the pork and sauerkraut &/or the salad table and there were multiple other food stations with many other choices that were enjoyed by all, including a wonderful dessert table.

This tour was the first time that President Rich Aronson (and Roberta) had been to Tara and they enjoyed the entire day immensely. After brunch they enjoyed touring the upstairs area which - in addition to the rooms for overnight accommodations - also is a museum in many different regards for this mansion built in 1854. Some of us who had previously toured the upstairs area instead walked the grounds outside after brunch and enjoyed the statuary and other outdoors art and plantings that were beautiful along with the swimming pool.

"THE 100 GREATEST RACES"

An Unofficial Compilation

Instead of just listing the 100 greatest F1 races, this book categorizes the races into 10 chapters, such as Chapter 1 Thrillers "Late Drama, Tight Finishes", Chapter 2 Duels "First Among Equals" and Chapter 3 Comebacks "Through the Field". Each chapter gives a brief explanation of the content followed by a count down of the 10 races that make up the chapter. Each race has very interesting facts such as a summary, results, top 6 or so drivers



and their constructors, period photograph date and location of race etc.

The book's forward by Karun Chandhok, former F1 driver and current F1 TV commentator, provides an excellent summary of the book's content. The introduction talks about the 75 years of F1 racing starting with the first race held at Silverstone in 1950 up to and including the 1,120 Grand Prix races, the May 4th 2025 Miami race.

The book is great for the F1 fan/historian and just the thing to help you get through the months between the end of the 2025 and beginning of the 2026 F1 seasons.

1966 Jaguar Mk2 Restoration - Part 18

I'm living my own less-madding form of the infamous Chinese Water Torture. My torture is just like its more famous big brother but involves various automotive fluids in place of water and my garage floor in place of my forehead. I don't physically feel it, but I can sense that drops of oil, water, coolant, brake and power steering fluid are drip, drip, dripping on the floor, despite my best efforts.

I detected a small puddle of brake fluid behind the left and right front wheels and found that my new Wilwood calipers have the tiniest leak. The bleeders and associated fitting were snugged up and will be monitored. Likewise, there was damp spot on the cardboard under the car that looked suspiciously like Evens Waterless Coolant. I have previously tracked and corrected leaks, but this one

was particularly difficult. Turns out that the thermostat housing gasket was leaking, allowing a small, drip by maddening drip, trail of coolant down to the front suspension sub frame. The lowest spot in the subframe is the center so the coolant would pool in the subframe and finally drip from the center where there is no reasonable explanation. The thermostat housing nuts have been tightened (more) and I am cautiously optimistic.

But let's talk about happier things..... like the interior! Ron the windshield guy stopped over with his helper several week ago and got the windshield installed. He did not insert the exterior chrome trim, a very fiddly process whereby the chrome fits in two slots in the windshield rubber but said he would be back soon. Fortunately, I don't need to wait for "soon" to continue with the interior. Once the windshield was in place I was free to complete the front wood trim around the headliner and down the sides of the windshield. (See photo at right)

The carpeting is also all but complete. As with the carpet underlayment, the carpet kit that came with the car was very complete and only required some trimming here and there. All the carpeting over the transmission tunnel. insider rockers, rear toe kick and seat mounts is glued in place and extends onto the floor. Four precisely cut and bound carpet pieces (left and right, front and rear), overlap the glued-in pieces and create a nice, neat finish. I do need to cut a hole for the floor mounted headlight high beam switch but otherwise it is complete, and I am pleased with the results. I'm leaving the floor pieces out for now to avoid any damage from continuing internal work.

The center consol base is also in place but the insert does not have the necessary holes for the shifter or the ash tray.

That can wait.



The rear bench seat and the two front seats are now in the care of John Carey, an auto upholsterer recommended by club members. He works out of his home but happened to be in the neighborhood and offered to pick them up along with the foams and seat coverings from my Bartlett kit. I generally like to do things myself, but this is one area where a mistake can ruin a very expensive chunk of leather, and I don't think my work would have shown the same quality. Sometimes its best to leave things to the pros.

I never thought the day would come but I think it is time to think about registering the car. I'm planning on registering it as an Antique under PennDOT rules. It is a one-time registration fee, no annual inspections and allows you to bring your own period-correct license plate as long as the alphanumeric sequence is not already in use. Once I have a seat, it will be time for a drive.
